

We pray for young fathers, newly embracing their vocation; May they find courage and perseverance to balance work, family and faith in joy and sacrifice.


We pray for our own fathers around the world whose children are lost or suffering; May they know that the **God of compassion** walks with them in their sorrow.

Lots going on this weekend and week-Father's Day, approaching full moon (oh-oh) and Summer Solstice, last day of school for Braintree students, tend the garden, clean off the lawn furniture, gas up the grill, open the pool, plan the vacation! But even with all of the above and more, most of us manage to find more down time in summer than any other season of the year. Summer gives us more timewhether it's vacation mode or simply more hours of daylight or mostly reruns on TV. Let's make a conscious effort to set aside time and space to pray this summer. The question Jesus poses to his disciples is a good place to begin, a good one to take to prayer-more than once. FOOD COLLECTION SUNDAY IS THIS WEEKEND

The groceries you purchase for our food pantry also bring hope to the poor. If you are at the supermarket and feel overwhelmed by the choices in front of you, it helps to think in terms of mealtime. Perhaps you can begin by purchasing breakfast items: pancake mix, cereal, canned fruit or raisins, canned or bottled juice, coffee or tea or powdered milk. Lunch items with long shelf life include peanut butter and jelly, tuna fish, soup, crackers, canned pasta. Supper selections could be the same as lunch along with tomato sauce and pasta, canned or jarred vegetables, canned meat, rice and couscous, cooking oil and seasonings. Cake and brownie mixes are frequent sale items. Your donations of food items along with paper goods, cleaning supplies, personal care products, and even supermarket gift cards allow our pantry clients some breathing room in their limited budgets-even the opportunity to cover an overdue bill. And-with school about to close for the summer, families who relied on breakfast and lunch programs now have additional meals to provide. However you choose to help, please note that our St. Vincent DePaul Conference has no overhead. Everything we receive from you directly assists someone else. - **Military Service...** If someone you know is newly deployed and you would like their info to appear on the board, please call or email the parish office. Thank you.






