Having just completed a "staycation" where our typical household of 2 adults expanded to include 5 (grand) children and anywhere from 1 to 5 additional adults, I am struggling a bit with returning to my usual routine! In the wonderful busyness of planning and enjoying meals and activities together and of remaining open to what the day might bring, my usual prayer routine became more fluid as well. In today's Gospel, when the disciples ask Jesus to teach them to pray, he teaches them the prayer we know as the "Our Father" and instructs them to bring their needs to God. If you are feeling disconnected or distracted, perhaps the article below, reprinted with permission from the **University of Creighton Online Ministries** Home Page/Praying Ordinary Time Home Page will be of **help to you.**

Beginning Again: Talking With God

We have good intentions and resolves and one thing so many of us want is a deeper relationship with God. It is a longing that comes from our hearts but we don't always know what to do with it. Below are a few hints and resources to get us started – or re-started – talking to God. It sounds simple, so why does it get complicated? The good news is that God is the one who really wants to talk with us. God wants us to feel that he loves us with a bottomless love and is just waiting to listen to anything we want to say. Further proof of this good news: It was God who sparked our hearts to make us want to respond to him in a newer way. What is standing in our way?

I just don't know where to begin.

We can reflect on our prayer and what we mean by prayer. Sometimes the most difficult journey in prayer is the short distance from our heads to our hearts. We might enjoy reading theology and spirituality books and websites, but it can draw us into *concepts* and *ideas* about God rather than feeling in our hearts how much we are loved by God. The shift in focus happens when we move from "saying prayers" to praying in the sense of entering into a close, personal relationship, which centers on a sense of closeness, accompaniment and intimacy. Prayer is really just conversation with someone who loves us more than we can imagine. What do we want to thank God for? What do we worry about? What are we facing today? What do we want to ask of God? Speak, then listen.

I don't have a minute free all day – when can I possibly pray?

Spending 30 minutes in silent meditation is wonderful, but most of us can't do that in our lives. But we all can find small "in-between" moments in our lives when we can find a greater intimacy with God. It means looking for the tiniest spaces in our day when we can simply lift our hearts to God. St. Ignatius encouraged his followers to be "Contemplatives in Action," "seeking and finding intimacy with God, in all things," and we can do that by continually tucking small prayer spaces into our days. Developing this pattern in our days can help us feel accompanied by God all day long.

Here are a few suggestions. Which ones might work for me today?

- Brushing teeth is something we do every day for a few minutes. If we transform that time into a simple dialog with God, it can begin and end our day in prayer.
- A drive in the car can become a brief retreat if we turn off the radio and use that time to have a conversation with God.
- A regular shower or bath time can be the perfect, undistracted spot to connect with the One who loves us.
- We can pray walking to a meeting, crossing a street or heading into a store.
- As we reach to answer a phone, a 2 second prayer for the person calling can change my interaction with the caller.
- If we find our mind wanders, gently transform it into a prayer by saying to God, "I am distracted by the meeting I have today. Let me tell you what I am worried about."
 Or, "I can tell I am preoccupied by my relationship problems with my brother. Please give me the grace to forgive him." We can take our distractions to God and ask for help.
- Ask, "Where is my focus, on me or on God?"

As hard as we try to have an orderly and smooth welcome on the first day of Religious Ed classes, confusion seems to walk through the door. Within minutes we assign each child to a classroom and teacher and they get to work deepening their relationship with each other and with God.

No sooner is Mrs. Hopkins back in her office when a young child appears holding back tears. Quick to comfort, she learns this little boy is nervous. His fist is tight to his chest and he is clinging to something. Gently she invites him to let go of his fear. "You are holding something very carefully. May I see?" A smile appears as his hand opens to reveal a tiny green frog. He tells Mrs. Hopkins his father gave it to him who received it from his father. He was told if you hold the frog tightly your fear would go away. Clearly, a feeling of security and love has been passed down from generation to generation. No further explanation is needed... this frog is special since it holds within it the reassurance of something bigger than a small piece of metal. It is pure love in the palm of his hand. Mrs. Hopkins tells him God exists in the frog because God is present in the love he is feeling. "With God, you are never alone. Trust him."

By divine design and because this is the only way it can be explained, Mrs. Petrilli enters the office to this sweet scene. She is introduced to our little disciple and encourages him to share his family treasure. He reaches into his pocket and says confidently, "I love this frog." He doesn't need to tell her why because she can see within it

the power of love. Mrs. Petrilli reaches into the pocket of her sweater and pulls out a small rock to share. Like his frog, she carries her own tangible reminder of the love of God. On her rock is engraved one word...trust.



No words are necessary now. God is surely present.



Lord, on the day I called for help, you answered me.


