My Brothers and Sisters,

COME LORD JESUS!

This ancient Christian cry, which concludes the Book of Revelation and points to the end of all things, is also an appropriate prayer for the Season of Advent that begins today. Welcome to Liturgical Year 2017!

The Season of Advent is almost forgotten in the rush of Christmas commercialism and in the way our secular society celebrates holidays. In our culture the anticipation of our holidays is considered part of their celebration. There is a build-up to "the day" that grows in intensity culminating in an explosion of celebration and activity. Then it is DONE! December 26th, July 5th , the day after Memorial Day; back to school/work.

By contrast, the Church <u>begins</u> the season of celebrating our holidays on the day. The lead-up to the Feast can include some minor celebration—more anticipation, really. There is a growth in intensity, yes, but it proceeds from the work of spiritual preparation.

These two modes of celebrating are opposed, and giving appropriate attention to both is a bit of an art. Some ideas:

ADVENT WREATH: Yes, we have one in church but these really belong in homes. Procure and use one to the extent you can in your household.

ADVENT CALENDARS: Especially for kids, these can be helpful in combining celebration and anticipation.

CONFESSION: I'm pretty sure you'll be cleaning up the house for Holiday celebrations. Take time to put your spiritual house in order too.

PLAN HOW YOU WILL CELEBRATE THE CHRISTMAS SEASON: The Christmas Season in the Church begins on December 25. It technically concludes with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord (this year, Monday January 9). Our more ancient and still-venerable tradition was "The Twelve Days of Christmas" from December 25 to the Feast of the Epiphany or "Little Christmas" on January 6. The Christmas Season includes "The Feast of [St.] Stephen" 12/26, St. John's Day 12/27, the Holy Innocents 12/28, New Year's/Mary, Mother of God 1/1, and, of course, Epiphany (you can observe it on January 6, in the U.S. the bishops move it to the Sunday so it will be January 8 this year).

Choose to learn more about just one or another of these days and highlight it appropriately. Any prayer, gesture, or moment of charity or festival beyond December 25 can strengthen our faith and sense of Christ as central.

■ What about that Advent Wreath? After a conversation this morning, we invite those of you who use an Advent Wreath as part of your

celebration of the season to bring your wreath to be blessed during the Masses next Sunday, December 4. And if your wreath is cumbersome or so situated in your home that it is difficult to bring it to Mass, please consider bringing even just one of its candles instead. For those of you unfamiliar with the concept, simply Google "Advent Wreath."

It happens every year, as predictably as drawing up a shopping list, decorating the tree and planning the Christmas Dinner. Every year we think, "Now THIS is the year when I really will enter into Advent." And there it stays. Nothing happens. We know in our hearts that Advent can be more than a "pre-Christmas" season, more than those four weeks of getting ready for the Big Day on December 25th. We sit in Church and hear the different readings, the darkness and the promise of hope.

What if this Advent, we allow ourselves to imagine a life that is different? What if our hearts were at peace and our lives more satisfying? That longing in the most hidden corners of our hearts is something holy, a Holy Longing, a desire for a deeper relationship with God.

We might squirm at that and stammer all of the excuses we know: "Not now. I'm really busy. I'm not a very holy person. I'm going to get to a serious relationship with God as soon as my kids are gone... when I don't have to care for my parents; when I get the promotion at work; when we move to a new house." There are dozens of ways we can evade the issue, but still, that longing is there for something more.

Advent is a time to recognize both our holy longing and the healing love God has for us, despite the many barriers we put up between ourselves and God. We can start simply and just rest at the edge of our beds in the mornings, open our hands and whisper, "Come, Lord Jesus!" If we let ourselves feel what is in our hearts, we know they are filled with love. We can carry that experience with us as we go through even the busiest of our days. We may not know exactly where to begin or how to fill this longing in our hearts but it is simple. God waits with infinite love and with arms outstretched to meet us. The words we say don't matter. We

can speak as if God is a friend we have not seen in a long time, but one with whom we can sit in a comfortable silence. It's just about taking the first step. Even if we are fearful about this next step, we can say to God what is in our hearts. In this Advent season, it's time to risk, to make the first step, to find our way back home.

help in any of the following ways.


- 1) Take a tag from the tree and purchase a requested item.
 - If you take a tag from the tree, please look at it before you leave church to be certain that you are willing and able to purchase at least some of the gifts listed there. If not-simply return it to the tree and take a different card that more suits your mindset and your budget. If someone has listed a basketball, please do not substitute a board game. (Seriouslythis happens!)
 - Please check to see if the organization sponsoring the card has requested that you wrap the gift(s). If the tag says do not wrap, you can still help everyone involved in sorting and organizing by placing your purchase in a gift bag so that our volunteers can easily check the contents.
 - Please securely attach the tag you take from the tree to the outside of the bag or package. The tags are coded by color and number and we need them back so that your gift reaches the correct organization and recipient.
 - All gifts should be returned (left under the tree) no later than December 12.
- 2) If you are unable to shop, you can make a monetary donation [do not take a tag] and members of the Christian Service Commission will do the shopping and wrapping for you. You may place your donation in the collection basket in an envelope marked "Advent Giving Tree Program." Checks should be made payable to St. Francis of Assisi with "Giving Tree" on the Memo line.
