Annual giving at St. Francis funds many of the "extras" that enhance and distinguish a St. Francis of Assisi School education. Like many Catholic schools, we depend upon annual giving to bridge the gap between tuition and the full cost of a St. Francis of Assisi School education. Annual giving provides a significant percentage of the school's operating budget and enables us to attract and retain dedicated, talented, and creative faculty/staff to offer an unparalleled array of academic, enrichment, athletic, and arts programs. Your gift to the Annual St. Francis of Assisi School Fund will help us offer each student a truly exceptional educational experience.

In 2010-2011, our school received several unrestricted gifts in the foundational year of the Annual St. Francis of Assisi School Fund. The 2011-2012 Annual Fund runs through June 30, 2012, but we hope you will consider making your gift right now!

Levels of Recognition

St. Francis of Assisi School values annual fund participation at all levels of giving. Our leadership levels were established to celebrate donors who make the school a philanthropic priority with an unrestricted* gift to the Annual St. Francis of Assisi School Fund. *Unrestricted/restricted gifts – we encourage gifts to the Annual St. Francis of Assisi School Fund to be unrestricted, which allows the school's administration and board to use them to meet the school's most pressing needs. Donors who wish for their gift to be used only for a specified purpose, such as support for a particular academic program, capital improvements (i.e.: new windows), or for financial aid, may make a restricted gift.

Matching Gifts

Many gifts to the Annual St. Francis of Assisi School Fund are doubled, or in some cases even tripled, because corporations and foundations match gifts to education made by their employees, retirees, and directors. Matching gifts directed to unrestricted annual giving count toward recognition in leadership levels. Your eligibility, amount, and timing of your match are at the discretion of the matching gift company or foundation. Please check with your human resources office to determine if your employer will match your gift to St. Francis of Assisi School. If you are eligible, obtain a matching gift form from your employer, complete and sign the form, and send it to St. Francis of Assisi School along with or following your gift (follow instructions based on company or foundation).

Alumni and Reunion Giving

In these early years of annual giving at St. Francis of Assisi School, it is our hope that alumni will demonstrate their commitment to the school in countless ways, including vital support for annual giving. It is also our wish that our alumni will call upon their classmates to make a special gift in honor of their graduation year. We would love to see class reunions take place every five to ten years and have reunion and class giving become the cornerstone of class gifts.

ers are talented, trendy, and always on their toes! They have their pulse on 21st century education and are always ahead of the game when it comes to curriculum trends and learning. Read on to learn more about this dynamic duo!

Tell us about your background in the education field.

Ms. Rotondi: I studied at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, where I received a bachelor's degree in Education and Sociology, as well as, a master's degree in Elementary Education.

Ms. Sellitto: I always knew I wanted to be an educator. It started in high school when I would volunteer to tutor elementary students. I then went on to pursue my career at Westfield State College in Elementary Education and Mathematics. After graduating from Westfield, I attended Lesley University and received a Master's Degree in Elementary Curriculum and Instruction. It has been a long process but well worth it!

What led you to where you are today professionally?

Ms. Rotondi: As a child, I truly enjoyed going to school. I was rarely absent, as I did not want to miss anything! When I was in first grade, I broke my leg and could not attend school for six weeks. I was very upset about missing school, so my teacher, Mrs. Lampron, came to my house twice a week to make sure that I did not fall behind. I knew that Mrs. Lampron was very special and that she genuinely cared about my success. Since then, I have strived to become a teacher who makes a difference.

Ms. Sellitto: I've always had a great interest in helping others. I grew up as the big sister of two younger brothers. I picked up a lot of babysitting jobs when I was younger and volunteered tutoring at the local schools in my town.

Tell us about your work at Saint Francis of Assisi School, and why your career path has led you to teach in a Catholic school.

Ms. Rotondi: It is my third year teaching at St. Francis of Assisi School. I work at the morning and after school programs, where I am able to spend time with students of various grade levels. Catholic schools have a strong sense of community and exhibit the necessary values to guide us through life. I am appreciative of the supportive staff, and the amazing families with whom I have the opportunity to meet each year.

Ms. Sellitto: This is my third year teaching at Saint Francis of Assisi. I work the morning and after school programs and am involved in putting together the school yearbook. What is the most satisfying part of your job?

Ms. Sellitto: The most satisfying part of my job is the feeling I get at the end of the day. I often take time to reflect on my accomplishments and leave room for improvements. I could never explain the feeling of satisfaction I receive from teaching my students. It always feels like a day well spent.

What do you find most challenging?

Ms. Rotondi: I find it challenging that there is not enough time! There is so much information to learn, but so little time!

Ms. Sellitto: As a teacher, I have always found time the most challenging part. There is never enough of it!

What do you like to do in your spare time?



What advice do you have for your students?

Ms. Rotondi: Always try your best and believe in yourself!

Ms. Sellitto: I always tell my students to work hard and to have fun doing it. School is for learning but if we can have fun doing it then that is an added bonus! I never want my students to feel discouraged. I encourage them to always ask for help. Hard work really does pay off in the end.

What is the one thing that you would want the students

to take away from their experience with you?

Ms. Rotondi: I want my students to have confidence in themselves. I want them to know that anything is possible with continued effort and commitment.

Ms. Rotondi: I enjoy reading, baking, and spending time with family and friends.

Ms. Sellitto: In my spare time I love to read and craft. I live in the city, so I like to explore different shops and restaurants in the area. I often visit my family, who live about an hour from Boston, on the weekends.

Most importantly, I want my students to enjoy their time in school – learning is fun!

Ms. Sellitto: I want my students to put full effort into everything they do. I want them to feel like they've always tried their best and to be proud of their accomplishments, big and small. When they leave my classroom for the year they should feel a sense of pride in themselves.

our school, but to teach and share with others the gifts which he received at St. Francis of Assisi School. He has since moved onto Archbishop Williams High School, yet Ryan continues to live each day to its fullest, helping others, and making us proud to call him a St. Francis of Assisi School alumnus! Read below for a glimpse into Ryan's world to see firsthand why we've chosen to spotlight such a young, but accomplished alum!

This past summer, I traveled to the outskirts of Appalachia with eleven schoolmates for a mission trip sponsored by my high school, Archbishop Williams High School. Our mission was to assist needy families with painting and minor household repairs. In addition to paying our own expenses for the week, we provided both the materials and labor for these services.

We left early Monday morning, July 25, and drove six hundred miles to Dunbar, PA. Dunbar is a very small town located in the southwest corner of Pennsylvania. The median household income in Dunbar is twenty five thousand dollars, with sixteen percent of the population comprised of senior citizens. Twelve percent of the total population lives below the poverty level, and seventeen percent of Dunbar's senior citizens live in poverty.

Upon our arrival we were greeted by four Sisters of Charity of Nazareth who were our guides for the week. We stayed at the Sisters' remote mountainside retreat house and each evening were led in prayer and reflection by the Sisters. Sisters, who quickly became our friends and mentors. I was inspired by the Sisters' call to service, their dedication to the poor, and their generous spirits.

Each morning we awoke early and drove down the mountain to start our day of service. The first few days were spent painting the exterior of a wonderful woman's house. Jo is in her early eighties and has lived alone for many years with no relatives nearby. I think what struck me most about Jo was that she seemed very lonely and in need of companionship and love more than home repairs. While we were at her home, she spent most of her time with us telling stories, feeding us, and looking out for us. The time we spent with Jo was gratifying and humbling.

Our next assignment was painting the ceiling of a trailer home. Again we provided service for an elderly woman, Vera, who lived alone, and again was very thankful for our company.

The final project on our last day was working at the local food pantry. The pantry provides over one thousand boxes of supplies to needy individuals and families each month. In assembly line fashion, we packaged four hundred and fifty boxes and loaded them onto pallets for distribution.

The residents of Dunbar made a lasting impression on me. Two evenings we were hosted for dinner by neighbors of our beneficiaries as an expression of gratitude. These families did not have many more resources than the people we helped, but they were willing to share what they had to thank us. Their generosity provided a powerful example of gratitude.

The trip was not all work. We did have fun. We visited the convent of the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth in Pittsburgh and were treated to dinner and a swim. A local Dunbar family also invited us for a swim one evening. Because a bear on the property made going out after dark impossible, we played board games and cards back at the retreat house. I did not know many of my fellow volunteers before the trip because many of them are upperclassmen. However, relaxing at the retreat house gave me an opportunity to get to know them, and we quickly became friends. This was one of the best parts of the trip for me.

This was one of the best parts of the trip for me. I learned a few things on this trip. I realized that despite being the greatest nation in the world, America has a serious problem with poverty that needs to be addressed. I learned that no matter how little some people have to give, they are happy to share. This was demonstrated by my fellow parishioners at St. Francis of Assisi who helped greatly to sponsor our trip and by the residents of Dunbar who shared their homes and food with us while we worked in their community.

I learned that Jesus' example of helping the poor is a path to happiness. The gratitude demonstrated by the people we helped was deeply touching and appreciated. It made service truly rewarding. Finally, I learned that when you put a group of young people together, they can accomplish great things and make a difference in peoples' lives. I look forward to next year's trip, meeting new people, and making new friends while helping others.
