Nelson Mandela

On the 5th of December 2013, one of the most influential and inspiring men passed away at the age of ninety- five. His name was Nelson Mandela. Born on July 18, 1918 as Rolihlahla Mandela, he played a major role in the 1940s and continuing as a leader to try to put an end to the apartheid in South Africa. The apartheid stated that nonwhite South Africans had to live separately from whites, use different bathroom facilities, and contact between the two groups was limited. When the apartheid came about he felt the need to succeed in gaining fairness so he organized a military underground, but was caught in 1962 along with several other leaders. Mandela was sentenced to hard labor and life

imprisonment because of treason against South Africa's government. At long last in 1990, Mandela was released from prison and victoriously walked out to the crowd's cheers. In 1994, the apartheid officially ended and in the same year Mandela also became the first black president of South Africa serving for one term until 1999.

Mandela's funeral lasted 10 days with innumerable mourners giving their respect to their very much loved former president. Officials such as President Obama and his family as well as former President Bill Clinton his wife, former Secretary of State, Hilary Clinton were in attendance

Typhoon Haiyan

Typhoon Haiyan was a powerful typhoon that formed around November 3, 2013, ultimately affecting over one million people. Its highest point in one minute was 195 mph. Over 5,268 people had been confirmed dead. The typhoon has left about \$1.36 billion in damage. Typhoon Haiyan has affected areas in Micronesia, the Philippines, Southern China, and Vietnam. The Philippines call Typhoon Haiyan; Typhoon Yolanda. Haiyan originated in an area of low pressure several

hundred kilometers southeast of Pohnpei in the Federated States of Micronesia. The speeds of Haiyan's winds were 315 km/h surpassing the old record of 305 km/h set by Hurricane Camille in 1969. It first hit the Philippines where its strength was the strongest, then gradually weakening as it made five additional hits. It changed direction and turned over to the South China Sea, then westward where the typhoon eventually hit Northern Vietnam.


